

FOREWORD



In line with its commitment to provide at least 200 million USD annually, as made public by our Honorable **President Recep Tayyip ERDOĞAN**, Turkey has donated 456 million to the LDCs in 2015. Indeed, between 2011 and 2015, Turkey has donated over 1.5 billion USD to the LDCs – far exceeding what it has pledged.

The Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TİKA) plays an essential role in the realization and reporting of Turkey's aid for development. TİKA undertakes the role of coordinating development cooperation efforts between all related public bodies and institutions, and works diligently with its 56 Program Coordination Offices across 54 countries to more effectively reach out to those in need and to directly supervise projects and programs under implementation.

With each passing day, the architecture of international development cooperation gets more and more complex in terms of both the agents involved and practices deployed. At the same time, the responsibilities and obligations of global agents, especially the developed affluent nations, has been rising with regard to humanitarian aid due to escalating problems around the world.

In 2015, Turkey, taking full account of its responsibility, reached out to over 150 countries in the spirit of justice, fairness and truthfulness and lent the helping hand of the Turkish state to those in need regardless of culture, religion or ethnic background.

Our country, taking strength and inspiration from its civilizational values, has been advocating a stance that demands global justice for the problems of the contemporary world. In this respect, Turkey's projects, meant to address real and immediate problems of people around the world, are praised by the international community.

Recent crises reflect how mainstream models of development aid, being so implemented in narrow frameworks which tend to be unfair, patronizing and mechanistic have caused existing problems to become deeper and more chronic rather than ensuring welfare and peace to the people. Turkey, a fierce opponent of such models, has developed its own unique framework called the "Turkish Development Assistance Model." It incorporates cooperation with the establishment of ties of affection through concrete projects delivered in Somalia, Iraq, Afghanistan and several other brother countries in light of principles which prioritize people.

Our country, in rejecting models which reproduce unequal global power structures, offers all its experience and know-how to brother countries and friendly nations around the world, regardless of distance, in order to increase their human and institutional capacity, especially in terms of education and health, through projects in cultural, economic and business realms.

The Fourth UN Conference on Least Developed Countries (LDC-IV) was hosted by Turkey in Istanbul in 2011. Between 2011 and 2015, Turkey has donated over 1.5 billion USD to the Least Developed Countries (LDCs) – far exceeding the 200 million USD committed annually as made public by our Honorable President Recep Tayyip ERDOĞAN. In 2015 alone, this number was 456 million USD.

Unfortunately, the war and humanitarian crisis in Syria, raging since 2011, are still far from being resolved. Our country has not remained indifferent to the crisis, and has mobilized its resources to ease the pain of the displaced Syrian people. Syria was the biggest recipient of Turkish Official Development Assistance (ODA) in 2015, as was the case for the three consecutive years prior.

The Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TİKA) plays an essential role in the realization and reporting of Turkey's aid for development. TİKA undertakes the role of coordinating development cooperation efforts between all related public bodies and institutions, and works diligently with its 56 Program Coordination Offices across 54 countries to more effectively reach out to those in need and to directly supervise projects and programs under implementation.

I would like to congratulate all public institutions and bodies, beginning with TİKA, for their meaningful efforts in helping extend the reach of development cooperation projects around the world and to thank all TİKA personnel for the preparation of this year's Turkish Development Assistance Report.

Our country has continued to rise as a donor of development assistance with increasing pace each year. Official Development Assistance (ODA) provided by Turkey, which was 85 million USD in 2002, has reached 3.919 billion USD in 2015, representing a forty-five-fold increase.

Turkey ranked as the second largest donor country in the world in 2015 with a total ODA of 3.2 billion USD. Moreover, Turkey has been declared the most generous donor country in the world in terms of its GNI/humanitarian aid ratio.

Turkey has been working without any expectations of visibility or reward to deliver development and humanitarian assistance to those in need throughout the world, while at the same time struggling to liberate global development assistance from being dominated by pragmatist realpolitik mentalities. It thus advocates a high-spirited perspective based on global justice.

Despite the departure of formal colonialism, it's clear that its repercussions are still at work as seen in the unfair global relationships and current disequilibrium between developed and developing nations. That several geographies such as Africa and the Middle East, possessing the most abundant resources in the world, have been suffering severe humanitarian, political and economic catastrophes, is not a mere coincidence.

Turkey has been putting into practice a development assistance approach which does not focus solely on national income levels of countries and does not regard them as underdeveloped as regards to their low national income, but rather shows respect to their deep-rooted cultures and values and concentrates on their needs. Turkey defends the right of the just use of local wealth in the host country for its own people, and regards the opposite as the continuation of exploitation.

Today around 220 million children and youth are deprived of access to education – a basic human right. Over 60 million people live as refugees and over 25,000 people die every day due to starvation and related conditions. Turkey, despite being only the 18th largest economy in the world, has not remained silent in the face of these humanitarian crises and has become the most generous country in terms of humanitarian assistance, whereas several developed nations tend to turn a blind eye to this burden.

Further, our country has continued to rise as a development assistance donor with increasing pace each year. Official Development Assistance (ODA) provided by Turkey, which was 85 million USD in 2002, has reached 3.919 billion USD in 2015, representing a forty-five-fold increase.

In this regard, public bodies and institutions, as well as Turkish NGOs have continued to work hard to further advance Turkey's development cooperation efforts in 2015.

As a result of this, Turkey ranked as the second largest donor country in the world in 2015 with a total ODA of 3.2 billion USD. Moreover, Turkey has been declared the most generous country in the world in terms of its ratio of GNI to humanitarian aid.

ODA provided by Turkey has increased by 9% in 2015 as compared to the preceding year. This is well above the average increase of 6.9% in ODA among OECD/DAC member countries. Moreover, if development assistance provided by DAC members to refugees and asylum seekers in their own countries is excluded, the rate of increase would descend to 1.7%.

On the occasion of the release of the Turkish Development Assistance Report of 2015, I hereby congratulate and thank TİKA, which undertakes an essential role in the implementation of numerous development cooperation projects in different sectors and across a wide range of countries; all related public institutions and bodies along with their personnel; NGOs and their personnel who strive to reach out to across the world wherever help is needed regardless of distance; private sector representatives who support us in our efforts to maintain development cooperation and humanitarian assistance efforts; and last but not least, the TİKA Strategy Development Department which has worked diligently to collect our country's development and humanitarian assistance data and prepare this year's report.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

urkey's Total Development Assistance (TDA) for 2015 has amounted to a total of 5.105 billion USD. This development assistance, which went to over 150 countries, was applied in numerous different sectors. At the request of recipient countries, it was provided by Turkish NGOs and private establishments, and by over 70 Turkish public bodies under the principles of the authentic Turkish Development Assistance Model which prioritizes people, respect for local sensitivities and is aimed at ensuring lifelong opportunities without any expectations of reward.

Of this 2015 TDA, 4.032 billion USD comprised of Official Flows provided by public bodies and institutions, while Private Flows amounted to 1.073 billion USD.

ODA constituted 3.919 billion USD of Official Flows, while the remaining 113 million USD fell in the category of Other Official Flows. In that vein, 3.846 billion USD of ODA, which was in total 3.919 billion USD in 2015, was bilateral aid, and the remaining 73 million USD was multilateral aid.


Bilateral aid, which made up a total of 3.846 billion

USD in 2015, is divided into three subcategories: 2.738 billion USD of this was for Emergency Aid, 1.351 billion USD was classified as Development Aid and 243 million USD was designated for Concessional Loans.

Multilateral aid, on the other hand, is the total amount of membership fees and contribution payments to international organizations, and amounted to 73 million USD in 2015.

Private Flows, a subcategory of Turkey's TDA, is made up of aid provided by NGOs, which was 476 million USD, and direct aid to developing countries from Turkish private sector actors, which amounted to 597 million USD. Of the 476 million USD donated by NGOs, 336 million USD was for Emergency Aid, while 140 million USD was classified as Development Aid.

In 2015, Turkey ranked as the second largest donor country in terms of Emergency and Humanitarian Aid with a total of 3.2 billion USD spent, and as a result, gained the status of being the most generous donor country with a ratio of 0.37% of Emergency and Humanitarian Aid to national GNI.





In 2015, Turkey, with an aid amounting to 3.2 billion USD, ranked second in the world for the provision of humanitarian aid, and earned the title of "The Most Generous Donor" country in the light of its GNI to humanitarian aid ratio of 0.37%.

In 2015, Turkey donated 3.919 billion USD in Official Development Assistance - a 9% increase from the previous year.



Turkey's Development Assistance

Examining Turkey's distribution of total development aid over the years reveals a record breaking thirty-four-fold increase from 2002 when this amount was just 144 million USD to 2015 during which this number reached a sum of 5.105 billion USD. To break this down further, Turkey's ODA has increased an impressive 45 times from 85 million USD in 2002 to 3.919 billion USD in 2015.

Figures representing the Turkish Development Assistance components for the years 2014-2015 are shown in Graph 1.

Graph 1: Development Assistance of Turkey (2014-2015, Million USD)



Official Development Assistance 2015

The most important component of total development assistance is Official Development Assistance (ODA). This figure is used as a benchmark for international monitoring and evaluation. Turkey's ODA has increased 9% from 3.591 billion USD in 2014 to 3.919 billion USD in 2015.

Distribution of Official Bilateral Development Aid by Category




Graph 4: Regional Distribution of Bilateral Official Development Assistance (2014-2015; Million USD)



Territorial Distribution of Bilateral Official Development Assistance



Graph 5: Top Receiving Countries of Bilateral Official Development Assistance (2015; Million USD)





Graph 6 : Bilateral and Multilateral Distribution of Turkey's Official Development Assistance (2014-2015; Million USD)





Graph 8: Distribution of Payments Made to International Organizations (2015; Million USD)






International Status of Turkey in 2015 Official Development Assistance Rankings

Graph 9: Net ODA Figures of OECD / DAC Countries and Turkey (2015; Million USD)




Graph 10: Net ODA/GNI Ratios of OECD / DAC Countries and Turkey (2015; %) (UN Target: 0.7%)




Turkey's Sectoral Distribution of Bilateral Official Development Assistance in 2015


Graph 11: Sectoral Distribution of Turkey's Bilateral Official Development Assistance (2015; Million USD)


Graph 13: Official Emergency and Humanitarian Aid from Turkey (2005-2015; Million USD)

Foreign Direct Investments made by the Turkish private sector to developing countries in 2015 amounted to 597 million USD.


Graph 14: Direct Investments Made in Developing Countries by the Turkish Private Sector (2010-2015; Million USD)

The United Nations Conference on Least Developed Countries (LDCs) is held every ten years. The Fourth United Nation's Conference on LDCs was hosted by our country in Istanbul in 2011. We have exceeded our commitment to provide at least 200 million USD annually to the LDCs as pledged by our President, His Excellency Recep Tayyip ERDOGAN, with a total of 2.45 billion USD distributed between 2008 and 2015, and of which 456 million USD was provided in 2015 alone.


Graph 15: Turkey's Assistance to LDCs (2008-2015, Million USD)


Graph 16: The Top Recipient LDCs of Turkish Bilateral Assistance



EDUCATION

Education, which is an effective way of raising living standards by strengthening individual capacities and creating strong-willed and confident citizens for inclusive societies, is an essential element of development assistance. The education sector is a primary target of assistance provided by Turkey.

In order to extend the reach of education in cities, rural areas and hard-to-reach mountainous regions of underdeveloped and developing countries, Turkey has

been carrying out numerous projects with the objectives of building new and modern education institutions, refurbishing old schools, providing technological equipment and training material, and training teachers, administrative personnel and trainers.

Within this framework, some 73 schools were either built or renovated, and 67 schools were given equipment in 2015

Projects and Activities carried out by TİKA

Niger Mixed Boarding School and Friendship Park

In the framework of the project "Niger Mixed Boarding School and Friendship Park," a 42-classroom mixed school for 1260 students, a dormitory to serve a total of 648 students and a sports complex was built and furnished, and the Turkey-Niger Friendship Park was maintained and renovated.

Afghanistan Cevizcan (Jowzjan) Province Technical Education Institute and Dormitory

The Jowzjan Province Technical Education Institution and Dormitory is being built on two hectares of land in the city

of Sibirgan (Sheberghan) of Jowzjan province in Northern Afghanistan in order to provide job opportunities to youth and to augment the qualified labor force in the country.

Afghanistan Mazar-i Sharif, 42-classroom Bahter School Service Building

The construction of the 42-classroom Bahter School service building in the city of Mazar-i Sharif, which commenced in 2014, continued in 2015. The old service building, which was insufficient for the school's provision of education to some 7,000 students, was demolished, and a new one built.



Projects and Activities carried out by TİKA

Kazakhstan - Kul Hoca Ahmed Yesevi Learning and Wisdom Foundation's Vocational High School and Preschool Renovation

Kul Hoca Ahmed Yesevi Learning and Wisdom Foundation's Vocational High School and Preschool buildings in the Talgar town of Almaty were renovated. The vocational school has 6 classrooms and serves 130 students. The preschool has 3 classrooms which provide for 25 students each.

Uzbekistan - Tashkent Turkish Primary School and Secondary School Renovation and Refurbishing Project

All required equipment and material was provided for refurnishing, refurbishing, repairing and renovating the

Tashkent Turkish Primary School and Secondary School, which opened 1993 and which currently serves 180 students.

Project to Support Nursery of Ardhmeria Cultural Society

Materials, including furniture (i.e. shelves, tables, cupboards, cabinets, counters, teacher's desk, restroom stalls, letter-shaped furniture) and toys (toys for indoor use, training tools, construction toys such as cubes, mosaic toys, castles, educative toys, sports materials such as a basketball hoop, football goalpost, balls, bowling equipment, pedal cars and bicycles) to enhance the service quality of the nursery, which is managed by the Ardhmeria



Cultural Society, were provided.

"Children are the Gifts of the World", a project in Kljuc, Bosnia-Herzegovina

Kljuc is a municipality near the border of the Una-Sana Canton of the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, where the bulk of the population is comprised of Bosnians. Ljiljan Preschool, the only one of its kind, has been offering daily care and education to some 60 children since 1976.

Thanks to TİKA, after repair and renovation of the first floor of the school, which had heating problems due to physical conditions and dampness, the service capacity of the building has been increased and students are now able to receive education in a healthier environment. Also as part of this project, the roof has been repaired; restrooms, doors and window frames have been renewed, and walls have been painted. In addition, a more energy efficient heating system was installed with conversion from gas oil to solid fuel. In terms of equipment, the playground in the backyard of the

preschool has been rearranged and game equipment has been replaced

Motrat Qiriazi Primary School Renovation in Prizren, Kosovo

In the Kosovo Prizren Motrat Qiriazi Primary School, 13 classrooms in which language instruction in Albanian, Turkish and Bosnian is carried out were repaired. Additionally, two classrooms specifically reserved for Albanian students, were repaired and refurnished.

Furniture and Equipment Assistance for Syenitsa Preschool in Serbia

Required kitchen equipment and furniture (i.e. tables, beds, chairs, panels for children. dossiers. armchairs, toys, shelves, wardrobes, teacher's desk and chair, cabinets with drawers, gymnastics equipment, mats, multimedia projector, foldable writing desks, blackboard, equipment and furniture for teachers' room and headmaster's room, conference table, LCD TV, bins, and hangers) necessary for the Syenitsa Preschool to commence services were procured and provided.



SECONDARY EDUCATION



Refurnishing of Sheh Shamia High School in Shkodra, Albania

Required material for Shkodra Sheh Samia High School, which was built by TİKA, including equipment and electronic hardware for laboratories, furniture for administrative chambers and appliances for the dining hall were procured and provided.

Kazakhstan-Program for Training for Trainers in Vocational and Technical Education

The "Training for Trainers in Vocational and Technical Education" program, which has been underway in Kazakhstan since 2012 in collaboration with the Ministry of National Education, has seen the participation of 242 Kazakh trainers and administrators. The program is highly appreciated by Kazakh authorities, who have requested the continuation of this program.

In 2015, a total of 66 teachers from six different subject areas (motorized vehicles, agriculture, food, textile technologies, office management and primary school teaching) and two administrators participated the program. The first phase of the project was carried out in

six different vocational high schools in Istanbul under the Ministry of National Education. Study visits to the schools in Kazakhstan by experts from the ministry and TİKA constituted the second phase of the project.

Assistance for Gyula Krudy Culinary School in Szeged, Hungary

TİKA renovated kitchen furniture, natural gas and electricity infrastructure, procured culinary equipment, and met the need for a restaurant training/simulation hall in the Gyula Krudy Tourism and Hotel Management and Culinary High School, which has been operational since the 1930s in Szeged, one of Hungary's major cities.

Gambia Omar Bin Khattab School Renovation and Refurnishing

As part of TIKA's assistance to the ongoing construction of the Omar Bin Khattab Secondary and High School in Brikama which is 30 kilometers away from the capital city of Banjul, construction work on five incomplete classrooms was finished, while a new toilet was built and all equipment for the 13-classroom school, which opened in 2006, was replaced.



Projects and Activities Carried out by TİKA

Morocco University of Mohammed V

Multi-Purpose Hall Renovation Project

The multipurpose hall, VIP room, sound room and halls on the 2nd floor of the Dean's Hall Extension Building at the University of Mohammed V in the Moroccan capital of Rabat were renovated and furnished.






The Board of Governors at Ahmet Yassawi International Kazakh-Turkish University carried out the following activities:

- Budget transfer to the Rector's Office of Akhmet Yassawi University and the Eurasian Research Institute for supporting the activities of the Rectorate's educational services and the Eurasia Research Institute affiliated to the Rectorate,
- Central library construction, outfitting of library furnishings and construction of the open football field at the university campus,
- Reimbursing fees and expenses of Turkish academic and administrative personnel assigned to participate in the teaching and management activities carried out

- in Kazakhstan,
- Covering the expenses of graduates coming to Turkey to improve their professional knowledge, etiquette and personal development skills in training from teaching staff of the university's human resources department,
- Providing monthly scholarships for outstanding undergraduate and postgraduate level students in the Arts Colleges from disadvantaged backgrounds in the Turkic States and Communities and who are pursuing education in Turkish universities.



The full expenses of university personnel were met including: the 492 academic staff, composed of 156 Turks, 332 Kyrgyz and 4 from other countries:

40 Turkish and 244 Kyrgyz administrative staff;

135 other short-term contract personnel;

498 Turkish, 3,992 Kyrgyz, and 312 students from other countries among which 199 were Masters students and 81 Ph.Ds.



Graduate Scholarship Program for International Students



Turkey's Scientific and Technological Research Council (TÜBİTAK) provides support to encourage international researchers from Pakistan, India, Iran, South Africa, Iraq, Syria, Tunisia, and the Middle East either with a Ph.D. degree or in a Ph.D. program to engage in research for a maximum of 12 months in Turkey.

Support is provided to foreign nationals with a Ph.D. degree or enrolled in a Ph.D. program abroad on the condition that part of their research would be carried out in a university or research institute in Turkey. The aim of the program is to provide financial support to foreign nationals with a Ph.D. degree or in a Ph.D. program

abroad, who are willing to do part of their research in Turkey in the fields of natural sciences, engineering and technology, medical sciences, agricultural sciences, or social sciences and humanities in order to enhance our country's contribution to international cooperation in the fields of science and technology.



Graduate Scholarship Program for International Students

In support of the development of scientific interaction and international research chains and the promotion of Turkey, TÜBİTAK provides support for the 2015 Graduate Scholarship Program for International Students which targets foreign nationals who continue their graduate or Ph.D. studies in Turkey.

The scholarship program supports skilled, highachieving students who come from abroad to undertake a graduate program which includes a thesis, such as a Masters or a Ph.D. in Turkey in the following fields: natural sciences, engineering and technology, medical sciences, agricultural sciences, social sciences and humanities. (The program does not include studies for specialization in any major or minor branch and scientific preparation course within the field of clinical medical sciences, including dentistry.) Scholarship students are given monthly stipends as determined by the Scientific Council to cover expenses in Turkey. Students from Pakistan, Iran, Syria, Macedonia, Iraq, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Albania, Afghanistan, Yemen, Sudan and Bangladesh participated in the program in 2015.

Least Developed Countries (LDCs) Graduate Scholarship Program

This scholarship program aims to increase the number of qualified scientists and researchers by providing financial support to successful students, who are nationals of LDCs as categorized by the UN, and who are doing or are willing to do graduate studies that include a thesis and/or Ph.D. studies in Turkey in one of the following fields: natural sciences, engineering and technology, medical sciences, agricultural sciences, social sciences and humanities. Citizens Ethiopia. Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Gambia, Sudan, Tanzania, Saudi Arabia, Ghana and Yemen have benefitted from the scholarship program carried out by TÜBİTAK.

TÜBİTAK Researcher Support Program

Fellowship and Academic Support for Palestine Gaza Islam University Students

A total of 1,000 students as identified by Palestinian authorities, and who were the Israeli-led attacks, were granted 1,000 USD each. In addition to this, 21 students who continue their education in Turkey under the Gaza Islam University Academic Support Program were given a monthly stipend.



The fundamental aim of health policies is to improve the quality of life and life expectancy of citizens and thereby to increase their participation in economic and social life. While developed nations concentrate their efforts on improvement of access to, and quality and effectiveness of their health services, countries who are recipients of assistance focus on creating models through the construction and furnishing of health institutions and hospitals, and/or improving the quality of medical personnel through high-level practical training. In this framework, activities carried out in 2015 were as follows:

Projects and activities carried out by TİKA

Construction and Furnishing of Somalia Recep Tayyip Erdogan Teaching Hospital

TİKA procured all necessary medicine and medical consumables for the hospital, whose construction began in 2013. The enclosure walls of the hospital, measuring 1,073 meters in length, were replaced and strengthened with concrete and steel by TİKA.

Gaza Turkey-Palestine Friendship Hospital

The construction of the Gaza Turkey-Palestine Friendship Hospital was finalized.

North Afghanistan Health Institutions Management

TIKA met the management costs of 2 hospitals, 2 clinics and 1 midwifery school in Northern Afghanistan. Patients who were unable to self-support were also given free health services.

Health Weeks Organized Abroad

The Ministry of Health organized 'health weeks' in other countries on three seperate occassions in 2015.

Health Weeks Organized Abroad

Turkish-Kyrgyz Health Week: A total of 623 patients, admitted to departments including cardiology, cardiovascular surgery (CVS), general surgery, cosmetic surgery, gynecology, neurosurgery, and pediatric surgery received medical consultation and 92 of those underwent operations. A total of 70 Kyrgyz health personnel received training in three medical branches (gynecology, cardiovascular surgery and general surgery).

Turkish-Uzbek Health Week: A total of 381 patients, admitted to the cosmetic and reconstructive surgery department, received medical consultation and 109 of those underwent operations.

ASEOWA

Turkey, through the Under Secretariat of the Treasury, granted 1 million USD in assistance to the African Union to support the African Union Support to the Ebola Outbreak in West Africa (ASEOWA) initiative which fought against the Ebola outbreak.

Basic Health

Projects and activities carried out by TİKA

Furnishing of Montenegro Clinic Center

The Montenegro Clinic Center, with a capacity of 778 beds, serves over 40,000 patients. Further, it performs

an average of 10,000 operations, 3,000 deliveries, 9,000 dialysis treatments and 32,000 CT scans annually, along with other treatments and services. The clinic, with the busiest emergency service in the country, accepts patients from Podgorica, Danilovgrad and Kolasin municipalities, where there are no available health institutions. In 2015, the emergency service facilities of the clinic were renovated, and all required medical equipment and hardware were procured and provided.

Uzbekistan's Republic Maternity and Gynecology Clinic Training Center Renovation

The training center at Uzbekistan's Republic Maternity and Gynecology Teaching Clinic, where specialists in gynecological diseases, obstetrics, anesthesiology and intensive care are given theoretical and practical in-service training, was renovated.

Water is among the most fundamental needs for human survival. Global warming, pollution of resources, unplanned growth and diminishing water sources makes it harder to access tap and potable water. Our country, which built some of the largest dams in the world and connected continents with water channels, emerges as a hope for African nations suffering from a lack of water.



In order to alleviate the problems of water scarcity, Turkey continued to drill water wells in 2015 in several different countries with a particular focus on Africa and the Middle East where the lack of water can be severe. TikA and Turkey's General Directorate of State Hydraulic Works (DSI) drilled a total of 109 water wells in 2015.

Projects and activities carried out by TİKA

- 7 water wells were drilled in Gaza.
- Water wells were repaired and required material was procured in the village of Khristovka, Ukraine,
- The potable water system in the village of Kara-Buura in the Beysheke community of Kara-Buura district, in the city of Talas of Kyrgyzstan, was renovated.
- A water well was drilled in Tazakend village and a potable water project was put into implementation in the Lomanauri village both of which are located in the Kvemo Kartlı administrative region in Eastern Georgia,
- 5 water wells were drilled and agricultural tools and material were procured for use at a gardening facility, which was also built by TİKA, in Senegal.

Afghanistan

- Saplings were procured, a water well was drilled and a drip irrigation system was installed in order to establish an experimental garden for the Kabul University Faculty of Agriculture,
- A deep water well was drilled in the Tevhid neighborhood in the 15th city sector of Kabul,
- A water tank was built in the Chamtal district of the province of Balkh in Barga Turkmaniya,
- A deep water well was drilled in the Balkh Bastan High School in Mazar-i Sharif in the province of Balkh.

Projects and activities carried out were as follows:

Projects and activities carried out by DSI

- 9 medium-depth water wells were drilled in Syria,
- DSİ personnel were appointed to visit the Republic of Djibouti to give theoretical and practical training on the use of the Tamrok drilling machine which was granted to the country in the framework of the Project of Access to Clean Potable Water in Western Africa, to drill bores.
 25 water wells were also drilled in Mauritania,
- Empirical hydrogeological surveys and geophysical explorations were carried out in Sudan to measure the groundwater levels to drill water wells,
- Explorations were carried out in Burkina Faso to extend 73 water wells in use especially towards the hard-toreach and water-poor countryside,
- Equipment that is planned to be granted to the government of Niger was maintained and repaired,
- A total of 36 water wells, representing 1,650 meters of depth, were drilled to provide tap and potable water for the use of around 62,000 people.

SUPPORTING CIVIL AND ADMINISTRATIVE INFRASTRUCTURE

The higher the adoption of certain principles and practices, such as political representation, participation, accountability, effective civil society, rule of law and decentralization - all considered to be inalienable democratic values - by a society and its political machinery in a developing country, the easier it is for that country to accord with the developments in the contemporary world. Turkey has paid particular attention to the implementation of human resource related programs in order to improve records of developing nations in the aforementioned democratic institutions. Turkish public officials full-heartedly share their experience with the people of developing nations via years-long programs.



 A Public Bread Factory was constructed on a land parcel granted by the Bishkek Municipality of Kyrgyzstan, and required machinery and equipment were also provided by TİKA. The factory has a daily production capacity of around 30.000 loafs.

Projects and activities carried out by TİKA

• Mogadishu Military Facilities were constructed in Somalia under a peacebuilding framework.

International Police Training Cooperation Project

The activities carried out in the framework of the "International Police Training Cooperation Project," carried out collectively by TİKA and the General Directorate of Security, were as follows:

Azerbaijan

Bomb disposal vehicles, jammers, bomb disposal robots, and bomb disposal expert suits were provided at the request of Azerbaijan, a country open to regional and global security threats. The provisions were made to boost security measures against undesirable incidents including bomb attacks in the wake of the

nation's rising popularity as host of various major sporting and cultural organizations.

Gambia

600 police uniforms provided by the General Directorate of Security were delivered to the General Directorate of Gambian Police by TİKA.

• Bosnia and Herzegovina

Security equipment provided by the General Directorate of Security was delivered to the Interior Ministry of the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina via TİKA.

The General Directorate of Security also dispatched specialists to Pakistan, Somalia, Uganda, Sudan, Mongolia, Cote d'Ivoire, Kosovo, Palestine, Kyrgyzstan, Romania and the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus to provide training in other fields based on the requests of the recipients.

The General Staff Partnership for Peace Training Center (PfPTC) has also been actively contributing to partnership initiatives by conducting courses, mobile training activities and seminars for the members of NATO, Partnership for Peace, Mediterranean Dialogue (MD), Istanbul Cooperation Initiative (ICI), Partners across the Globe (PatG) and countries with which Turkey has bilateral relationships.


In 2015 PfPTC provided training programs to:

- A total of 1,088 armed forces personnel from 10 member countries,
- •A total of 188 personnel from 13 countries under the PfP program.



OTHER SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE AND SERVICES

Regarding other infrastructure and services, maintenance and repair of orphanages, retirement homes, shelters for women and children and disabled care centers had been undertaken to increase the service quality of such facilities. They were also provided material and equipment support and given assistance for care and health services. Some activities in this category were as follows:



Projects and activities carried out by TİKA

Assistance for 2,000 families in Gaza

Some 2,000 families, as identified in cooperation with the Palestinian Unity Government's Vice-Ministry of Social Affairs and Gaza Zakat Committee were granted assistance to rebuild their war-torn homes.

Tesanj youth center and library building construction project

The Tesanj municipality of the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina had started construction of a new library measuring 900 square meters and a youth center in 2008. Due to the municipality's failure to complete the construction, the rest of the project was undertaken by TİKA in 2014 and both buildings were erected.

Repairs and refurnishing of Vaziani sewing workshop

Georgia's Vaziani Sewing Workshop and its sales outlet were repaired and refurnished, and internally displaced people were provided training through the establishment of sewing and shoe-making workshops.

Procurement of 50 battery-operated or electric chairs for disabled people

50 battery-operated or electric chairs for disabled people were procured in Palestine.

Repairs of Gazakh Gunerzi Children Care Center

In collaboration between TİKA and the Society of Disabled Women, an association which implements projects to support disabled people, overhauling and renovation work was done on the Gunerzi Children Care Center in the Gazakh rayon of Azerbaijan near its border with Armenia. The center was founded to support the growth of children from poor families and to prevent them from being sent to orphanages.

Repairs and refurnishing of Orphanage No. 32 in Bukhara

The three-story orphanage building in Uzbekistan's Bukhara city, which provides shelter and education for 89 children, and consists of an administrative room, a

library, an infirmary, an entrance floor computer room, a second-floor bed chamber for girls and a thirdfloor bed chamber for boys, was overhauled and refurnished by TİKA.

Supporting women's employment in Congo

100 computers were provided in support of women's employment in the Republic of Congo.

Project for procurement of 80 sewing machines

40 sewing and 40 overlock machines were procured and delivered to people in need in Palestine/Gaza.



The Mostre Health Center in the city of Visoko, Bosnia and Herzegovina, was opened by TİKA



Repairs and refurnishing of Uman Municipality's Homeless Persons Reintegration Center

The "Homeless Persons Reintegration Center," a facility under the social services department of the labor and social security administration of Uman city council in Ukraine, was overhauled and renovated. Military facilities and the related military area at Dmitrushky village were allocated to the labor and social security administration by a decree of Ukraine's council of ministers, and a social services complex was established on the land.

Uzbekistan Bukhara Orphanage

The complex includes a homeless persons reintegration center with a capacity to serve some 30 people. It provides reintegration services including shelter, social adaptation, health care and employment training for homeless people, including former convicts who have served prison terms, and drug and alcohol addicts.

Home repairs in the cities of Maglaj and Sanski Most of Bosnia and Herzegovina

TİKA and the Turkish Union of Municipalities signed a cooperation protocol to renovate homes damaged by flood in the cities of Maglaj and Sanski Most of Bosnia and Herzegovina. A total of 279 houses were repaired under the project, which was completed on April 2015.

Flood-damaged home and public building repairs in Maglaj and Zeljezno Polje

Thanks to financial assistance by the Turkish Union of Municipalities, TiKA has completed repair work on a total of 161 homes and public buildings, 115 of which were in Maglaj and 46 in Zeljezno Polje.

Transport of 30 prefabricated houses to Bosnia and Herzegovina


30 prefabricated houses procured by Konya Metropolitan Municipality were delivered to Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Transportation and Storage

Donation of 20 trams to Bosnia and Herzegovina

20 trams were donated by the Konya Metropolitan Municipality to Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Donation of 20 vehicles to Monrovia Municipality, Liberia

20 vehicles were donated to Monrovia Municipality as part of the town twinning protocol signed between Monrovia and Istanbul Metropolitan Municipality.

Rehabilitation of Enguri Bridge at the Georgia-Abkhazia administrative border

The Enguri Bridge, which provides a land connection between Abkhazia and Georgia was rehabilitated by the UNDP, and supported by TİKA in order to foster trust-building and conciliation between Georgian and Abkhaz people.

Solar system installation at Juba Airport and procurement of generators

In the framework of the project to renovate the Juba Airport in South Sudan and to make it suitable for international flights, TİKA supervised the installation of CVOR and DME systems, renewed the solar system to fit the new infrastructure, and replaced 24 batteries. Efforts to illuminate and pave the grounds were also initiated.

New bridge construction at Novi Brachin village of Razanj Municipality

The tender for the construction of a new bridge to replace the flood-damaged structure over the Jovanovacka River at the village of Novi Brachin of Razanj Municipality was provided by TİKA.





A total of 98 journalists from Sub-Saharan Africa, America, Europe, Asia, the Far East and the Middle East, along with 95 embedded advisors, were provided with hosting services as part of the Turkish Directorate General of Press and Information's program to host international media representatives who visit Turkey for professional purposes.

Establishment of a TV studio at the Faculty of International Journalism

In the framework of cooperation with the International Relations Institute of the Turkmenistan Foreign Ministry, a TV studio was established at the Faculty of International Journalism for the use of students in the broadcasting department. TİKA, which cooperates with the institute in several capacities also organized seminars, conferences and lectures in the fields of international relations, international trade, management, international law, international journalism, and history and records management under joint education programs.

Baku State University TV Studio

TİKA provided computers, server and software as well as supported technical capacity and curricula of higher education institutions that specialize in journalism in Baku State University.



Energy Generation and Supply

International Industrial Energy Efficiency and Management Training Program

In collaboration with the General Directorate of Renewable Energy, TEDAS gave a week-long training in Turkey to a committee of 12 senior executives from the Sudan Electricity Distribution Company.

Industrial Energy Efficiency and Management Training Program

In collaboration with the General Directorate of Renewable Energy, TİKA and JICA, a total of 12 participants from Ukraine Albania, Kosovo, Tajikistan, Kazakhstan, Turkmenistan, and Kyrgyzstan received training in the framework of the Industrial Energy Efficiency and Management Training Program, held between 3 and 16 May, 2015.

Improvement of Physical Infrastructure of Constitutional Court of Mongolia

The necessary transceiver equipment for the improvement of the electrical installations of the Mongolian Constitutional Court were replaced by TiKA.

Banking and Finance

The Central Bank of the Republic of Turkey (TCMB) held technical training programs for central bank personnel from 12 countries. The program appointed 121 advisors for the program which offered training to a total of 127 experts from 12 countries. The table below gives a summary of the trainings provided by TCMB.

International Islamic Finances Conference Project

The International Islamic Finances Conference was held in Baku with collaboration from the Social Union to Understand Economic Resources (an association operating in Azerbaijan), the Azerbaijan State Economics University (ADIU), the Istanbul Economic Research and Consultation Institute (ISEREC) and the Al-Huda Center of Islamic Banking. Support was given for the conference participation of 13 individuals from Turkey, Pakistan, Indonesia, Malaysia and Tunisia.

Astana Economic Forum

The Union of Engineers and Architects of the Turkic World held meetings at key events during the VIII Astana Economic

Forum including an Investment Forum, an Asian and European Leaders Forum, a Eurasian Economic Congress, a Revival of the Silk Road session and a city planning session. They also introduced the union and its projects and objectives. TiKA supported the participation of a six-person group from the Union of Engineers and Architects of the Turkic World, including the union administrators and representatives of their project team to attend the forum.



Agriculture, Forestry and Fishing

Projects and activities carried out by TİKA in the fields of agriculture and husbandry

- 5 combine harvesters were donated to the Tunisian Ministry of Agriculture.
- Work to establish "Anatolian Faculty of Agriculture" in Somalia continued.
- 1000 bee colonies and various beekeeping materials were delivered to 100 families in Azerbaijan.
- A total of 500 families in some 72 villages in Eastern Macedonia were given seeds and greenhouse cultivation equipment for year-long production of high-yielding vegetable varieties (pepper and tomato).
- In the framework of the project "Improvement of Vegetable and Greenhouse Cultivation in Gunja Region of Croatia" 50 greenhouses were bought and mounted on the land.

- 10 stud bulls were sent to an artificial insemination center in Sudan.
- A total of 100 greenhouses were donated to the municipalities of Nova Varos, Tutin, Bujanovac and Ljubovija as part of an initiative by the Serbian government entitled "Sustainable Development Assistance Program in Agricultural and Rural Fields."
- Support was provided in the scope of a livelihood program in cooperation with Bangsamoro Development Agency of the Philippines for preparation of land for goat rearing as well as for the procurement of needed material and equipment including 50 training materials, 60 vaccines, 40 pieces of technical equipment, 3 promotion plates, and office furniture.



- BELWET, an association operating in Burkina Faso, was provided with material for fencing the 6.5 hectares of land used in the "Project to Raise 100,000 Moringa Oelifera Trees."
- 37 tons of seed and various agricultural equipment were provided as part of the "Seed Support Project for Darfur Farmers."
- 5 water wells were drilled and a gardening facility was built in Senegal as part of the "Dialogue for Reconciliation and Sustainable Livelihoods for Women Project" in order to support peace efforts in the region and to harness the agricultural potential of the country.
- Preparatory work was done for natural poultry raising in Shariff Aguak and Cotabato City/Shariff Kabungsuan in the Maguindanao region of the Philippines, including rehabilitation of fields and procurement of material to build chicken houses needed for poultry raising.
- One seed separating machine with a stainless-steel strainer, one oil



pressing machine with a filter, and one dryer were donated as part of a project to establish a prickly pear (Opuntia) processing facility in Tunisia to produce oil, flour and pulp to be used in the cosmetic, pharmaceutical and gastronomy industries to support production sectors in the country and offer

- employment opportunities to 50 people.
- 125 families were given a threeweek training while 1,000 bee hives and swarms were distributed in order to increase beekeeping in the Beni Matar and Haraz regions of Yemen.

- Equipment was distributed in the scope of the "Montenegro Greenhouse Cultivation Project."
- 10 onion harvesters were donated to the Vucitrn Municipality of Kosovo.
- 350 beehives and tools were provided as part of the Tunisian Charity Beekeeping Support Project.
- A total of 55 families living in 15 different villages were given 90,000 raspberry saplings at the request of the Inter-Municipal Union of Agricultural Associations (MOUPU) of Novi Pazar, Serbia and Regional Development Agency (SEDA).
- 20 milk cows were donated to

- women-headed households in Pakistan.
- 15 Ekomilk devices, 15 alcohol guns and 600 30-liter milk cans were delivered as part of a project by the Kosovo Vucitrn Municipality to increase milk quality and to support milk producers.

Projects and activities carried out by the Ministry of Forestry and Water Affairs

- The "International Course on Erosion, Flood and Landslide Projects" was held.
- 20,000 grizzly juniper tree saplings, 20,000 Arizona cypress saplings, and 10,000 thuja saplings were donated to improve the forestry nursery of Turkmenistan.
- Agricultural tools were donated as part of the project.



Fishery projects and activities carried out by TİKA

• 15 floating fish cages were donated as part of a project for the rehabilitation and renovation of typhoon-damaged fisheries in the Philippines. The project is expected to provide employment for 100 people and produce 25 tons of marketable fish per season.

• In support of the Al-Ittihad Farmers and Fisher Folk Marketing Cooperative, a project was initiated in the Philippines for the production of tilapia, a fish species of high commercial value. The project worked with 108 cooperative members in sustainable livelihoods training focusing on tilapia farming and marketing. The project, which consisted of two 6-month phases, including a practice period and a monitoring and evaluation period.



Trade and Tourism

Tourism Projects and Activities

- Training was given to tourism trainers from Togo on new trends and innovations in the tourism industry at the Antalya Muratpaşa Practice Hotel through cooperation between TİKA and the Ministry of National Education.
- TİKA sponsored the Turkish Culture Week held in Morocco.
- Booklets and promotion materials were published by TİKA in support of the Serbian Tourism Development Strategy at the request of the Commerce, Tourism and Telecommunication Ministry of Serbia.
- 2 tourism trainers from Vanuatu were given a two-week "Turkish Culture and Cuisine" training by the Turkish Culinary Federation.







Humanitarian aid is described by the UN as assistance to save the lives and relieve the pain of people affected by crises. Humanitarian assistance, as specified in the General Assembly decree no. 46/182, must be provided in accordance with the principles of humanity, neutrality and impartiality.

Humanitarian aid is described by the OECD DAC as assistance and actions designed to save lives, alleviate suffering and maintain and protect human dignity during and in the aftermath of emergencies. This includes assistance to people who are affected by conflicts and related crises and disasters, such as by helping them meet their needs of lodging, food, water, sanitation, health care etc. Assistance provided during emergencies other than conflict situations is also considered humanitarian aid.

Humanitarian aid expenditures of Turkey

In 2013, the Global Humanitarian Aid Report listed Turkey as the 4th largest donor with a total humanitarian aid expenditure of 1 billion USD in 2012 following the US, the EU and the UK. It ranked as the 3rd most generous country after Luxembourg Sweden with a ratio of 0.13% in terms of the proportion of humanitarian aid dispensed to its GNI. In the 2014 Global Humanitarian Aid Report, our country once more ranked as the 4th largest donor and the 3rd most generous country in terms of humanitarian aid provision with a total expenditure of 1.6 billion USD after the US, the EU, and the UK. In 2015, Turkey, with 3.2 billion USD in humanitarian aid, has ranked second in the world in terms of humanitarian aid provision, and also earned the title of "Most Generous Donor" country globally

as measured by its humanitarian aid to GNI ratio of 0.37%.

In 2015, Turkey became the second largest provider of humanitarian assistance with a total expenditure of 3.2 billion USD, while ranking first in generosity with a ratio of 0.37% in terms of the proportion of humanitarian aid provided to GNI. Humanitarian aid provided by Turkey saw a 31% increase as compared to the previous year.

Humanitarian aid trends in the world and Turkey's conditions should be examined comparatively to determine the exact donor profile of Turkey in terms of humanitarian aid. Respective donor countries with the highest humanitarian aid expenditures in 2015 were as follows: [1] The US: 6.4 billion USD; [2] Turkey: 3.2 billion USD; [3] The UK: 2.8 billion USD; [4] The EU: 2 billion USD; [5] Germany: 1.5 billion USD.

Top country rankings in terms of the ratio of humanitarian aid expenditure to national GNI were as follows: [1] Turkey: 0.37%; [2] Kuwait: 0.33%; [3] United Arab Emirates: 0.25%; [4] Sweden: 0.19%; [5] Luxembourg: 0.16%. The US ranks 19th in this list with a humanitarian aid to GNI ratio of 0.04%.

Countries that provided the most assistance to asylum seekers in 2014-2015 were as follows: [1] Germany; [2] Sweden; [3] Turkey; [4] The Netherlands; [5] the US.



AID TO SYRIAN PEOPLE

Turkey has hosted and continues to host nearly 3 million Syrian refugees who have fled internal strife in Syria. In line with its open-door policy, Turkey has granted these refugees temporary protection status, and has not deported any Syrian refugees seeking safety in our country.

Around 260,000 of these refugees have been living in 26 temporary accommodation centers established and run by AFAD across 10 cities.

They have been granted temporary protection by AFAD of the Prime Ministry, and their needs are being met through joint efforts of the ministries of Internal Affairs, External Affairs, Health, National Education, Food, Agriculture and Livestock, Transportation, and Finance, as well as the Turkish General Staff, the Directorate of Religious Affairs, the Undersecretariat of Customs, and the Red Crescent.

Temporary accommodation centers provide heating, security, worship facilities. infrastructure. communications, translation, psychobanking social assistance, fire-fighting services and include convenience stores, laundry and dishwashing rooms and showers. In addition to these basic services, education and vocational training are also offered in order to meet the social needs of the Syrians. Recreation centers, children's parks



playgrounds, TV rooms, and internet service have also been provided for the convenience of our Syrian guests. Furthermore, Syrian citizens are provided with ration cards to meet their food needs which they can use in the convenience stores located in the temporary accommodation centers.

In light of the highest possible standards being offered to Syrian asylum seekers in our country, Turkey has become a pioneering model country in the eyes of the international community and especially to the UN.

AFAD is the responsible coordinating authority for the regulation of procedures of the Syrian population in Turkey. In this regard the directive concerning the admission and

accommodation of the nationals of the Syrian Arab Republic and stateless people residing in the Syrian Arab Republic who collectively seek asylum in Turkey was issued in March 2012 in order to specify the guidelines of legal treatment towards the Syrians in Turkey.

AFAD issued directive no. 12816 – 2013/8 on September 9, 2013 as a response to the mass influx of refugees from Syria and the subsequent increase in pressure on national health services resulting from the spread of this incoming population to virtually all cities, starting from the metropolises. The Directorate granted free health services to the Syrian people in the country to alleviate this pressure to the benefit of all people throughout

the country . AFAD also developed the Electronic Aid Distribution System (EY-DAS) which puts donors and those in need on the same channel so as to ensure aid is distributed in the most efficient way by matching supply with demand. The system also helps to minimize double distribution of aid, extends the reach of aid to all people in need, and ensures that aid is distributed in such a way as to prioritize those suffering the most.

Furthermore, the problem of education of Syrian youth who are otherwise eligible to continue higher education but had entered Turkey without passports was resolved by enabling them to enroll in Turkish universities.



26 temporary accommodation centers in 10 cities in coordination of Disaster and Emergency Management Authority

AFAD

AFAD coordinates efforts to provide health care for and to meet the daily basic needs of around 260,000 Syrian and Iraqi citizens who have taken shelter at 26 temporary accommodation centers across 10 cities in Turkey. Related ministries, public bodies and institutions and the Turkish Red Crescent deliver several services including accommodation, food, health care, security, socializing opportunities, education, prayer facilities, translation, communication, banking and other services at the tent and container cities.

The temporary accommodation centers also include schools, mosques, police stations, health centers, trade centers, media briefing units, playgrounds for children, TV rooms, convenience stores, tailoring courses, water tanks, water treatment facilities, transformer stations and power generators.

Humanitarian Aid provided by AFAD in 2015

Afghanistan

In the wake of the magnitude 7.5 earthquake that hit the Badakhshan province of Afghanistan on October 26, 2015, AFAD coordinated the immediate dispatch of humanitarian aid consisting of 5 tons of medication to Kabul, the capital city of Afghanistan.

Nepal

In the wake of the 7.8 magnitude earthquake with a depth of 15 km that hit some 77 kilometers east of the capital city of Kathmandu, 3 personnel from AFAD, 25 personnel from AFAD's Istanbul branch and 10 UMKE personnel were sent to the region. Four personnel from the Turkish Red Crescent, 15 from GEA, 13 from IHH, 3 from Doctors Worldwide, and 20 from AKUT also participated in operations in the region. AFAD provided medication and medical consumables, hygiene material and food, and the Turkish Red Crescent sent 1,000 blankets and 320 food packages. Another shipment of food and medication aid was dispatched to the region following the second 7.4 magnitude earthquake which hit on May 12, 2015.

Yemen

As part of humanitarian aid operations in support of Yemen and the Yemeni people who took shelter in Djibouti due to the internal conflict in their country in 2015, 2,400 food packages were prepared and 6 tons of medication were sent to the region. On August 3, 2015, an additional 2,000 food packages, weighing 45 tons, were provided.

Other Humanitarian Aid Operations

- Non-food aid material was dispatched to Myanmar in collaboration with UNICEF.
- In light of WHO reports on health about the Ebola outbreak in Guinea, Sierra Leone and Liberia, AFAD and the Ministry of Health

- procured and organized the air delivery of medication and medical consumables to Liberia.
- 1,700 food packages were sent to Albania.
- Financial aid was provided to Vanuatu.
- 1,650 beds and box springs were dispatched to Malaysia.
- Via the Turkish Red Crescent, relief material including 100 winter tents, 100 kitchen sets, and 1,000 blankets were sent to people who have been temporarily displaced due to internal strife in Ukraine.
- 15.000 tons of flour was sent to Gaza as part of an in-kind food assistance project in collaboration with UNRWA which started in 2011. Turkey has sent a total of 43,500 tons of flour to Palestine since 2011

Foreign Ministry's Relief Efforts toward Fire and Flood-Ridden Ghana

Accra, the capital city of Ghana, faced and damage. Many were left homea devastating flood disaster in 2015 due to heavy rainfall. Following the flood, a fire increased the death toll

less and lost adequate access to basic needs and services.

In the wake of the flood and fire, the

Ministry of Foreign Affairs dispatched humanitarian aid to Ghanaians affected by the disasters.



Humanitarian aid was provided to 160 families suffering as a result of landslides

Heavy rain which fell on July 19 and 20, 2015 in Tajikistan caused landslides in several cities and regions in the southern part of the country including Shughnon, Rushon, Vanj and Darvoz in the mountainous Gorno-Badakhshan Autonomous Region; the cities of Kuhistoni, Ayni and Panjakent in Sughd province; the cities of Panj, Hamadoni, Bokhtar and Jilikul in Khatlon province; and the Rast Valley. TİKA, responding to the call of Tajikistan's Prime Minister Qohir Rasulzoda, sent relief material including three-month supplies of basic foodstuffs to 160 families who were victims of the disaster.

Humanitarian Aid Operations in Afghanistan


TİKA provided humanitarian aid to Afghanistan in several different capacities. This included humanitarian aid for terror victims, emergency aid for flood victims, emergency aid for avalanche victims,

and tent and food aid for Afghani victims of a landslide that occurred in the Koktaba village of Rustaq town in Takhar province.

Humanitarian Aid to Palestine

TİKA provides assistance for emergency needs arising from

periodic Israeli attacks against Gaza. In this context, a total of 46 projects were carried out between 2005 and 2015. In 2015, fuel was sent to Gaza to relieve energy shortages resulting from infrastructure damage due to Israeli attacks. Wounded Palestinians were also treated in Turkey.





Humanitarian Aid Operations in Iraq

A total of 78,652 families living in or at the environs of the cities of Sinjar, Arbil, Kirkuk, Dohuk, Sulaymaniyah, Tuz Khurmatu, Kifri, Altun Kopru, Diyala, Keler, Khanaqin, Tall Kayf, Baghdad, Najaf, and Karbala, and living in temporary camps established in Bahirke, Bersiva, Kelek, Yahyava, Hazir and Celevle benefited from 146 truck-loads of relief material delivered to Iraq in 33 shipments which began in June 2014. The total number of beneficiaries, based on average household size, is estimated to be around 390.000.

Humanitarian Aid in Somalia

A total of 45,000 tons of humanitarian aid material was sent to Somalia in 18 shipments - 10 by air and 8 by sea - and was dispatched to nearly every part of the country, with Mogadishu being the first destination.

In addition, the Turkish Red Crescent established a tent camp named Jaazera Hayat on October 31, 2015. The camp consists of 1,830 tents in the Jazeera region of the capital city of Mogadishu. The tent city provides accommodation to some 3.175 households (approximately 25,400 people) including displaced families, which are spread around the camp. Moreover, a mobile bakery has produced around 11.5 million loaves of bread and the Red Crescent's kitchen has delivered around 11.9 million meals since the camp's establishment.

The Red Crescent has also implemented numerous projects in Mogadishu including garbage collection and whitewashing; the establishment of medical waste disposal units; the construction of Red Crescent stadium; a concrete plant and a cobblestone production facility; establishment of

a mobile bakery unit and a kitchen; landscaping and development of Xamarweyne coast, airport and environs; and renovation of side roads. Construction of an industrial vocational high school is ongoing.

Assistance to Kenya Najah Orphanage

Financial aid granted by LC WAIKIKI to the Red Crescent was used for procurement of educational material for and the renovation of the Najah Orphanage in the Garissa Province of Kenya.

Humanitarian Aid Operations in Bangladesh

As part of the Red Crescent's activities in Bangadesh in 2015, vulnerable Rohingya refugees, who have fled to Bangladesh due to clashes in Myanmar, along with Bangladeshi Rohingyas and other Bangladeshi people struggling in camps in Cox's Bazar were provided with food packages, clothing, and meat at Eid al-Adha and an Iftar meal during Eid el-Fitr.

Humanitarian Aid to Pakistan

Activities carried out in scope of humanitarian aid operations to Pakistan in 2015 were as follows:

- Support was provided for orphanages in Islamabad.
- 15,000 doses of meningitis vaccine were granted and delivered to Pakistan by the Ministry of Health.
- 745 food packages were delivered to people suffering from the Muson rains; beef from 350 cattle was distributed to those in need during Eid al-Adha; 1,000 food packages were distributed to those in need during Eid al-Fitr.



Humanitarian Aid Operations in Palestine (Gaza)

A total of 44 medical devices and furniture items were provided for two new hospital floors which were recently constructed atop the Deralbalahta Shuhada Al-Aksa Hospital; financial aid was provided to custodians of orphans in five regions including Jabalia, Gaza, Khan Yunis, Rafah and Central District; 2,000 food packages for Eid al-Fitr were distributed to those in need in the Beit Hanoun Municipality; support was provided to the al-Amal Orphanage.

Humanitarian Aid to Montenegro

Three truck-loads of aid material were transported to Montenegro to meet the needs of 25 couples preparing for marriage.

Humanitarian Aid Operations in Kosovo

A total of 10,000 items of winter clothes and 1,000 food packages were delivered.

Eid al-Adha Food Aid Operations in 2015

In the scope of the Eid al-Adha operations of the Red Crescent in 2015, 2,990 cattle and 1,932 sheep were sacrificed in a total of 18 countries and 21 regions including Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Montenegro, Kosovo, Macedonia, Serbia, Bangladesh, Pakistan, Ethiopia, Somalia, Niger, Iraq, Palestine, Kyrgyzstan, Senegal, Mauritania, Chad and Syria, and a total of 96,558 meat packages were distributed to those in need.





TİKA

In Kathmandu, a dermatome device and a baby incubator were donated to a hospital. Four truck-loads of humanitarian aid were also distributed among 1,300 families in the Nuwakot earthquake zone, and two other affected villages. In addition, 800 school bags and stationery materials were distributed to students.



AFAD

Under the coordination of AFAD, search and rescue and humanitarian operations were carried out by the Turkish team which consisted of 81 people, including 10 from the Ministry of Health National Medical Rescue Squads (UMKE), 40 from Red Crescent, and an additional 31 personnel from Turkish NGOs.

Turkey is one of 22 countries that sent search and rescue teams to Nepal following the earthquake.

To help mitigate the consequences of the earthquake, 16 tons of humanitarian aid material including packages consisting of food, medicine, and hygiene and other medical supplies were sent to the region by AFAD.

KIZILAY Turkish Red Crescent

Under the Nepal Humanitarian Assistance Operation of the Turkish Red Crescent, 320 nutrition kits, 1,000 blankets, 12 tents, 6 sleeping bags and 5,211 tarpaulins were shipped from Turkey. In addition, 5,660 potable water kits and 1,000 hygiene kits were distributed to those in need.



TURKISH DİYANET FOUNDATION

A humanitarian team was dispatched to the area. In addition, supplies of blankets, tents and food parcels were provided.





ISTANBUL METROPOLITAN MUNICIPALITY

The Istanbul Fire Brigade Team, consisting of seven rescue workers, served as a pioneer unit participating in earthquake relief work in Nepal.





Emergency relief:

Nepal and Pakistan Earthquakes

Earthquake victims were given basic necessities, provisions and food packages. Aid was sent to Afghanistan, Nepal and Pakistan as part of the "Humanitarian Aid for Natural Disaster-Earthquake Project."

Palestine/Gaza

A total of 8,306 families were given food packages in the scope of humanitarian food aid.

Iraq

Milk, clothing for children and women, cleaning products and food packages were distributed to 500 refugee families in Kirkuk. Food packages were distributed to 100 orphan families in or near Baghdad. Further, 1,675 families were provided with emergency food aid in Ramadi.

Yemen

In-kind relief was provided for families affected by floods.

Afghanistan and Pakistan

An aid campaign was initiated in Turkey to decrease the earthquake death toll, and collected funds were sent to these countries.

Aid Activities Benefitting Syrian Refugees

 A total of 10,615 containers and 2,417 tents were provided for approximately 15,000 Syrian refugees across 8 camps

The educational needs of 5,000 students (at primary, secondary and high school levels) in Aleppo were met. A total of 800 orphans, out of a total of 1,631 receiving assistance, were given lodgings in camps.

Aid was supplied to nearly 250,000 orphans. Of those, 5,430 orphans were given financial assistance in Syria. Further, 210 orphans residing in orphanages in Hatay are being looked after on an on-going basis.

- 362,600 loaves of bread were produced on a daily basis thanks to mobile bakery units established in 7 camps and distributed to a total of 143,000 people.
- 2,122 tents across 9 tent sites provided accommodation for 9,807 Syrian refugees.

The activities carried out in 2015, in scope of the "I Need You Project" were as follows:

- Provision of accommodation (tents, blankets, carpets, stoves, fuel, and repair services etc.),
- distribution of rations, food (including baby food), meals and bread (1,393,620 pieces/packages or sacks),
- preparation of Iftar and Sahur meals for 32,000 during Eid al-Fitr,
- provision of 1,903,728 pieces/pairs of clothes and textile products,



- provision of strollers, bags etc.,
- provision of 46,352 aid parcels,
- provision of 934 pieces of kitchen utensils,
- provision of 3,652 textile products (bedclothes, sheets, pillows, quilts etc.),
- provision of 699 cleaning and hygiene products,
- provision of 11,618 medical items,
- provision of 90,164 items/sets of educational material,
- Monthly financial support to 80 orphans, and in-kind aid for 4,956 students and approximately 200 teachers,
- Financial and in-kind aid including funds, scholarships, food, clothing, cleaning, fuel and health care for Syrians in need,
- Provision of food aid, meat for Eid al-Adha, mobile bakery units and winter season assistance for Syrian refugees and people living in Gaza, Palestine.

Social Services

- Orphan sponsorship projects: Monthly orphan sponsorship funds were provided in 2015 between January and July to 1,772 orphans in Mauritania and 31,081 orphans across 29 other countries.
- **Orphan projects:** Child war victims in Gaza, Palestine were given winter clothing, and the accommodation expenses of orphans in Uganda were covered.
- Stationery distribution projects: Stationery materials were procured for 8,352 orphans in 15 countries.
- Ration distribution projects: Around 10,000 people in Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast, Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Cameroon, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, and Sierra Leone received rations.
- Rations were distributed to orphans and families in need across 29 countries during Eid al-Fitr.
- 20,348 orphans in 22 countries were given clothing in the scope of clothing aid projects.





- Food aid worth 400,000 USD was distributed to people in Afghanistan, Albania, Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast, Palestine, Ghana, Georgia, Cameroon, Kosovo, Macedonia, Mali, Niger, Serbia, Sudan, Tanzania, and Uganda.
- 2,764 pieces/sets of educational materials, 95,479 kg of food, 11,640 items of clothing, 32 various articles, and 105 cleaning and hygiene products were dispatched to Bayırbucak and Yayladağı.
- A total of 72,700 people in Africa were provided with food packages.
- 1,112 children in Thailand, Palestine, and Syria were given gift boxes for Eid al-Fitr.
- "My House Becomes My Workshop" Project: 100 families in Bangladesh were provided with sewing machines for toll manufacturing. Additionally, transportation vehicles (called rikshaws or tuk-tuks) were given to 30 families to support their livelihood efforts.
- 185 advisors were appointed as part of a project across

- Somalia, Afghanistan and Sudan to help fight famine and provide education to 7,825 children in camps.
- 3,000 goats were distributed in Niger in 2015.
- Educational complexes for orphaned children in Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Malaysia, Mongolia, Sudan and Syria were provided with financial assistance.
- Iftar programs were organized in Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Ethiopia, the Philippines, Ghana, Iraq, Kosovo, Lebanon, Macedonia, Pakistan, Somalia, Sri Lanka, Syria, Thailand, Uganda and Zimbabwe.
- Rations, food boxes for Iftar, food packages and holiday presents worth 289,000 USD were distributed to people in need across 17 countries.
- In-kind assistance in the form of clothing, education, medication, fuel, and cleaning and hygiene products were distributed in Syria, Kyrgyzstan, Uganda, Kenya, Ivory Coast, Niger, Ghana, South Sudan, and Zimbabwe.



Education;

- The Kyrgyzstan Jalal-Abad Education Complex was constructed.
- Management costs of the Pakistan/Khubaib Haripur Education Complex for Orphans were met.
- Management costs of the Somalia Anatolia Education Complex for Orphans were met.
- Financial assistance was provided to partially cover health care, scholarships, accommodation, transportation etc. for 1,082 students from 72 countries studying in Turkey under the "International Guest Student Project."
- Grants and allowances for accommodation, transportation, health care and travel were granted to 123 foreign students.
- Educational activities in Albania, Burkina Faso, Ivory Coast, Georgia, Cameroon, Kosovo, Macedonia, Niger, Serbia, and Tanzania were supported as part of the "Education Assistance Project."
- Financial assistance was provided for construction of dormitories in Bosnia and Herzegovina.
- Financial assistance was provided for construction of a complex consisting of an orphanage, a school etc. in Somalia.
- The al-Aksa Preschool project was financially supported.
- Annual costs of 30 boarders at the Konya Culture Center established in Mongolia as part of the "Let's Overcome Darkness through Education Project" were covered.
- As part of the "Hidden Africa is Educated Project,"

- 2 classrooms and 2 lodgments were constructed in Zimbabwe.
- A total of 138 local teachers were hired for a year to provide education to 1,545 students in Kazakhstan, Serbia, Kosovo, Albania, Montenegro, Sri Lanka, and Georgia.







WASH Projects

- A total of 867 water wells were drilled including 292 in Chad, 108 in Somalia, 139 in Ghana, 73 in Kenya, 58 in Uganda, 109 in Niger, 30 in Sri Lanka, 32 in Burkina Faso, 10 in Bangladesh, 8 in India, 5 in Indonesia, and 3 in Ethiopia.
- 34 water wells were drilled in 14 water well projects including 15 wells in 4 projects in Afghanistan, 6 wells in 3 projects in Ivory Coast, 7 wells in 2 projects in Cameroon, 4 wells in 4 projects in Mali, and 2 wells in 1 project in Tanzania.
- Following water well drilling in Niger, 100 vegetable seed packages were distributed and production was supported.
- 167 existing water wells in the Taiz region of Yemen were filled with water benefiting 17,177 families (approximately 120,240 individuals).
